Here are often-asked questions about the show.

Is the show open to the general public? Yes.

What is the address for the NC State Fairgrounds? 4285 Trinity Rd, Raleigh, NC 27607

Is First Aid available? Yes, EMTs are located in the Exposition Building during show hours.

Where is parking? The main parking for the show is located on Trinity Road near the corner with Blue Ridge Road. Parking within the fairgrounds is not allowed during the show.

Is handicapped parking available? Vehicles with handicapped tags may enter Gate 9 off of Trinity Road.

Are wheelchairs or motorized scooters available? Motorized scooters are available for rent at the main entrance.

Is food available at the show? Yes — concession stands and food trucks are located throughout the show.

Can equipment be purchased at the show? Exhibitors are allowed to sell equipment on display for pickup or delivery after the conclusion of the show on Friday.

Are dogs allowed? Dogs are allowed on the North Carolina State Fairgrounds, but are not allowed in the exhibit halls and tents. Exception for qualified service animals.

Are motorized vehicles allowed? Only battery-operated wheelchairs are allowed. Golf carts and four-wheelers are not permitted.

Is RV parking available? RV parking is available through the N.C. State Fairgrounds. Call 919-821-7400 for details.

Rain or Shine? Yes, the show takes place regardless of weather. If a weather emergency causes the show to close a notice will appear on the show website.

Southern Farm Show: Trusted partner in both good and difficult times



IN BOTH GOOD times and difficult times, farmers from across the Carolinas and Virginia have turned to the Southern Farm Show over the years as a trusted partner to help them succeed in producing the crops and livestock that feed the world.

Southern Farm Show Manager David Zimmerman, marking his 40th year in 2025 managing one of the South's largest and most important farm shows, says the Southern Farm Show is needed most in difficult times.

"Every farmer in the country uses the winter months to think about what changes they need to make for the upcoming growing season. That is especially true when they come off a tough year like the one they just had. This is why the Southern Farm Show is held at the beginning of February. It's designed to help farmers answer those questions, and make good decisions.," Zimmerman says.

The Southern Farm Show is set for Wednesday, February 5, to Friday, February 7, at the N.C. State Fairgrounds in Raleigh. Show hours are 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Wednesday and Thursday, and 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Friday. Admission and parking are free.

The Southern Farm Show is the largest and most well attended farm show in the Carolinas and Virginia, with more than 400 manufacturers and suppliers exhibiting. It is also the second largest event held each year at the state fairgrounds, second only to the N.C. State Fair, and draws a crowd of more than

30,000 each year.

All seven buildings on the state fair-grounds are used, plus additional heated temporary structures and outdoor exhibits. Farmers who want to see the latest and greatest display of farm equipment know that the Southern Farm Show is the place to go with the largest annual display of farm equipment and supplies to be found in the Carolinas and Virginia.

The Southern Farm Show is also the largest annual display of landscape, land clearing, and outdoor power equipment in the region, and it is the largest annual display of construction equipment in the three-state area.

Continuing education is a focus of the Southern Farm Show each year with numerous seminars and meetings held each day to help farmers improve their bottom line. Zimmerman says the greatest value of the Southern Farm Show is the opportunity for farmers to network with other farmers, suppliers, and agricultural professionals.

The Southern Farm Show kicks off with the annual Kickoff Breakfast, set for 7:15 a.m., Wednesday, February 5, at the James Hunt Horse Complex. Featured speaker will be Ray Starling, general counsel and president of the N.C. Chamber Legal Institute, who will discuss the new N.C. Ag Leads strategic planning initiative to strengthen North Carolina's position as a leader for agriculture and agribusiness.

This new planning initiative is a collabora-

tive effort between the Golden LEAF Foundation and the N.C. Chamber Foundation, with support from N.C. Farm Bureau and Google. It is overseen by a steering committee that includes Commissioner of Agriculture Steve Troxler in addition to representatives of Golden LEAF, N.C. Farm Bureau, and the N.C. Chamber.

The North Carolina Growers Association (N.C. Growers) will again hold their annual meeting at the Southern Farm Show. This year's meeting, which is open to their 750 farmer members, will take place at 1:00 p.m. on Wednesday, February 5, in the Holshouser Building. N.C. Growers Deputy Director Lee Wicker says the meeting will review the 2024 season and provide members with a look ahead to 2025.

A highlight of the Southern Farm Show will be the Ag Development Forum set for 9:30 a.m., Thursday, February 6, at the Holshouser Building. The forum is sponsored by the North Carolina Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services and features Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler's annual "State of North Carolina Agriculture" address.

Invited speakers will focus on the latest trends in North Carolina agriculture and an economic outlook will be presented. The forum concludes with a sponsored lunch and is open to all attendees of the Southern Farm Show.

Breakfast with the Commissioner, held



each year to benefit the Tobacco Farm Life Museum in Kenly, will be held on Friday, February 7, at 7:30 am in the Holshouser Building. The breakfast has recognized many prominent ag industry leaders over the years, with this year's honor going to Parker Phillips, whose career of 49 years has focused on agri-business commerce related to the marketing of farm chemicals.

For the past 24 seasons, Phillips has been employed by Fair Products, which manufactures premium tobacco sucker control chemicals and is based in Cary, N.C. Throughout his career, Phillips has been very involved in the agricultural community and has received numerous awards and recognitions.



DAVID ZIMMERMAN'S TENURE directing the Southern Farm Show started with the 1985 show, making this his 40th time leading the annual event. Zimmerman grew up in the trade and consumer show business. His parents Robert and Joan Zimmerman produced their first event — a flower and garden show — in the N.C. State Fairground's Dorton Arena in 1961, the same year David was born. David went to work for the family business, Southern Shows Inc., the day after he graduated from college in 1983. It wasn't long after that when his father decided he knew enough to put him in charge of the Southern Farm Show, which had debuted at the N.C. State Fairgrounds seven years earlier in 1978.

We asked Zimmerman about his time with the show.

Question: Two years out of college seems a bit young to be put in charge of a show like this. Were you ready?

Answer: "In charge" is a bit of a stretch. I had the title of Show Manager and did most of the work, but my father definitely kept an eye on what I was up to. I guess I proved that I could handle it, so the oversight soon faded. The show was not as big then. It filled the Graham Building and Kerr Scott Building and there were a few outdoor spaces.

Question: Have you been the manager the entire time?

Answer: As I helped my parents grow the company to around 20 annual events and a staff of 30, and took over management of the company, there were a few years along the way that other staff members managed the show. However, like my father, I kept a close eye on everything and was at every show from move-in through move-out.

Queston: What changes have you seen over the years?

Answer: The basics of the show, which is farmers coming to the show to see equipment and talk to experts, has not changed one bit. That is still what the show is about and always will be. The show has certainly grown a lot, with the biggest part of that growth being the expansion of outdoor exhibit space. In 1985 there were a few exhibitors just outside the Jim Graham Building. Now there are over 110 spread over a large area, plus another 140 exhibitors in the five exhibit tents.

Another thing that has changed is the size and the number of activities surrounding the show. In 1985, the show did not use the Holshouser Building. Now there are seven major meetings and events that happen just in that building. Plus, the show now uses the Hunt Horse Arena and the Martin Building for meetings and events, and there are other show-related activities that take place outside the fairgrounds.

Question: What were some of the major milestones for the show?

Answer: There are a few things that have helped the show progress. Early on, there was another farm show that took place in Wilson and Greenville. When that show stopped being produced, the focus was all on the Southern Farm Show. Another boost was in 1996, when we started to use large tents to accommodate overflow exhibitors. The opening of the Exposition Center in 2005 was another big help, though we still had to use the tents. There are now five large tents to take care of exhibitors the buildings will not hold. But mainly, the show has experienced a slow steady growth over the years.

Question: Any major hiccups along the way?

Answer: The only major roadblock we have encountered was the pandemic a few years ago. It of course affected all major events, but fortunately it all started after the 2020 show. We had to forgo the 2021 show and returned in 2022. In a way, we were fortunate in that many annual events were cancelled for two or three years.

Another situation was in 2000, when the week before the show it snowed 20 inches in two days. It happened before exhibitors started moving in, but after the Equipment Tent had been set. That tent collapsed and we had about four days to figure out what to do with all those exhibitors. We squeezed them in wherever we could and actually ended up continuing to use some of those newly-created areas the following years. What saved the show was an unbelievable job clearing snow by the N.C. State Fairgrounds crew. Also, by the time the show started, the roads were clear, and the fields were soaked, so the farmers flocked in. In many ways it was a lemons-to-lemonade situation, but it did not feel like it at the time.

Question: What has been your philosophy about the show?

Answer: There are a couple of principles I have stuck with that may sound counterintuitive. At last year's show, a radio personality interviewing me was a bit surprised at my response after he commented that the show is a great place for everyone to come out and learn about



agriculture. I replied that while that's true, I don't really want the general public at the show, and that the N.C. State Fair is a much better opportunity for public exposure to agriculture.

I said that because I have always viewed the Southern Farm Show as a trade show for farmers. The show is produced for them. While that sounds obvious, many farm shows around the country are in rural areas and are more of a community event, which works well for them. The reason I don't want the general public here is that the farmers and company representatives only have so many hours at the show, and they need to spend that time talking to each other, not to curious urbanites. One way I've accomplished this is by only allowing agricultural companies and organizations to exhibit. Each year, I turn down dozens of companies wanting to sell everything from jewelry to gutters at the show.

The second principle is that I want the show to be nice but not too nice. Again, it gets back to the farmers — I don't believe they care that much what the show looks like, or if companies bring in big corporate displays. They just want to see the equipment and talk to someone who can help them make decisions. While I want the show to be well produced and organized, I also want it to be approachable for farmers. That's why we do not charge admission or register guests. I also try my best to make the show an easy and cost-effective experience for exhibiting companies. If they need something, they talk to me as show manager. That's not the case at most events.

Question: Have the participating companies changed over the year?

Answer: It's amazing how many of the same companies have been a part of the show for the entire time. While the number of ag companies has increased, the number of companies in affiliated industries has also grown. Those industries include land clearing and construction, forestry, and landscaping. Much of this increase is because many farmers are also involved in these industries, so they are also interested in that equipment. Also, many people who are full-time in these affiliated industries grew up on a farm and still own land. Much of the growth in landscape equipment is also due to the growth of the Raleigh area. Wake County alone has grown from 350,000 to 1.2 million in the 40 years I've been running the show.

Question: Any plans for the future?

Answer: Despite having done this for 40 years now, I'm only 63 and I really enjoy producing the show, so I plan to keep on making it happen each year. As for the show, I hope to continue the steady and deliberate growth it's enjoyed for years. The available facilities at the fairgrounds restrict the show from expanding too much, but we have been able to make growth happen. At the last show, I kidded Commissioner Troxler that while I'm his biggest fan, I am kind of looking forward to him retiring so they can build a new exhibit hall and put his name on it.



FOR FAMILIES WHO attend the Southern Farm Show every year, a highlight is to head to the Hunt Horse Arena on the N.C. State Fairgrounds on Friday night after the show wraps up to see the impressive draft horses that compete in the Southern National Draft Horse Pull and Coon Mule Jump.

The draft horse pull and coon mule jump serve as the grand finale of the Southern Farm Show. It is set for Friday night, February 7. Starting at 6 p.m., pre-pull entertainment includes a parade of antique farm equip-

ment and the ever-popular Coon Mule Jump. Show attendees can watch giant teams of draft horses match their strength to determine the winner.

Event organizer Calvin Davis said he and his team are looking forward to the competition returning to showcase these amazing animals that have entertained and delighted Southern Farm Show attendees ever since the first Southern Farm Show was held at the State Fairgrounds in 1978.

Davis emphasizes that it is a family event, with generations of families attending each year. "Many who attended the pull as children now bring their own children and grandchildren. It means a lot that the pull has become a tradition for so many families," he said.

Doors open for the Horse Pull at 5 p.m. and the show begins at 6 p.m. Concession will be available at the Horse Pull. Tickets for the pull are \$12 at the door with \$10 advance tickets available at the Graham Building during the Southern Farm Show. Youth tickets, ages 7 to 11, are \$6 with children 6 and under admitted free.

The Southern National Draft Horse Pull and Coon Mule Jump is the largest horse pull in the Southeast. Each year 20 teams compete for prize money.

Horses in the competition weigh in right at a ton, making the two horses in the competition weigh in at two tons. "The horses will start to pull at 5,000 pounds and win out at 10,000 to 12,000 pounds. The horses start at a lighter weight so they can warm up and run multiple times," Davis explained.

The distance required for a legitimate pull is just under 27 feet, and the horses pull in a straight line between two points. "Somewhere at about 7,000 to 8,000 pounds, we will have horses that don't make the distance, and they will drop out. We finish when one team pulls farther than the others," Davis said.

N.C. Growers to meet Wednesday

THE NORTH CAROLINA Growers Association (N.C. Growers) will again hold their annual meeting at the Southern Farm Show. This year's meeting, which is open to their 750 farmer members, will take place at 1:00 p.m. on Wednesday, February 5, in the Holshouser Building. N.C. Growers Deputy Director Lee Wicker says the meeting will review the 2024 season and provide members with a look ahead to 2025.

N.C. Growers' mission is to help farmers continue to be productive by providing a stable, legal and reliable workforce. North Carolina has many crops that are not easily harvested by machines. They include sweet potatoes, blackberries, lettuce, tomatoes, strawberries, and Christmas trees. Seasonal workers are often needed for this challenge, and many farmers rely on the federal H2A program to meet that need.

Because the Federal H2A Program includes some very technical and cumbersome requirements, it is often more than individual farmers typically have the time and expertise to implement.



This is where the N.C. Growers step in by assisting their members in complying with those requirements. That includes recruiting local workers and the facilitation of foreign H2A workers through the visa application process. N.C. Growers submits the paperwork on behalf of farmers, deals with the federal government, helps farmers understand and meet their legal requirements, coordinates arrangements for selected guest workers, and acts as a problem-solving mediator between employers and employees during the growing season.

Since 93% of North Carolina farms are under 500 acres in size, the service provided by N.C. Growers allows many family-owned farms to stay afloat. Approximately 30% of N.C. agricultural employers rely on the H2A agricultural visa program to keep farming, and many need experienced workers to do the work. Through N.C. Growers, the labor force remains consistent and skilled. Approximately 92% of all H2A workers return annually through the preferred worker program.

NCCIA is an organization of seed growers/seed conditioners that administers the Seed Certification Program throughout North Carolina for all crops. The purpose of the Association is to maintain and make available to the public, through certification, sources of high-quality seed and propagat-

THE N.C. CROP IMPROVEMENT ASSOCIA- ing material of varieties so grown and dis-

tributed as to ensure genetic identity, a high degree of genetic and mechanical purity, and a minimum of seed or plant-borne disease.

NCCIA is dedicated to assisting clients in the production, identification, dis-

tribution and promotion of certified classes

of seed and other crop propagation materials. Seed certification aims to assure high seed quality and maintain varietal purity. NCCIA provides these certification services to seed growers to assure what they are selling is pure. Growers must meet land requirements, provide source of seed, and pass a field inspection. Once the field passes as certified, it qualifies for a blue certified seed tag.

During the meeting, the Foil McLaugh-



FRANK PARKER PHILIPS, III, son of Frank P. Philips, Jr., and Naomi Fisher Philips, made his debut on February 20, 1953, at Park View Hospital in Rocky Mount, N.C. A lifelong resident of the Twin Counties of Nash and Edgecombe, he was reared


on Oak Forest Farm near Battleboro. Graduating from Northern Nash High School in 1971, Parker subsequently graduated from Wake Forest University in 1975, where he majored in Speech Communications.

His career of 49 years has focused on agri-business commerce related to the marketing of farm chemicals. For the past 24 seasons, he has been employed by Fair Products, which manufactures premium tobacco sucker control chemicals and is based in Cary, N.C. His territory includes Eastern North Carolina and Southside Virginia. In conjunction with his agriculturally based employment, Parker is very involved in the agricultural community. He has served on the Agri-Business Committee of the Rocky Mount Chamber of Commerce and on the Board of Directors of the North Carolina Pesticide Association. Assisting for several years with Opening Day activities of the Rocky Mount Tobacco Market, Parker composed the lyrics of a song to accompany the motto of the Chamber of Commerce, "Tobacco is Gold in Rocky Mount." Parker also wrote a poem, "That's What Tobacco Means to Me", which chronicles the history of the tobacco industry and his nostalgic reflections of the industry. In addition to his recounting the history of the tobacco industry through his poetry, another one of his poem creations celebrated the life of Eugenia VanLandingham of the Extension Service of Edgecombe County. Another one of Parker's poems paid tribute to Dr. Bill Collins, Tobacco Specialist and Professor Emeritus of N.C. State University. To commemorate the 135th opening of the Wilson Tobacco Market which began in 1890, Parker composed a poem titled, "One Hundred-Thirty-five Years and Counting."

Parker has assisted with the Farm-City Breakfasts for both Nash and Edgecombe Counties for many years. He has worked as an auctioneer with the Tri-County Nash, Edgecombe, and Halifax 4-H Livestock Meat & Animal Show and Sale since 1975. He likewise auctions for the annual Hertford/Northhampton counties 4-H Animal Show and Sale. Parker himself was a member of the Nash County 4-H when he was in High School at Northern Nash. He focused on the public speaking competition which he won at the county level in 1971 and progressed to the district competition held at Campbell College. In June of 2017, Parker was inducted into the local Nash County 4-H Hall of Fame, and in July of 2017, he was inducted into the N.C. State University 4-H Hall of Fame.

In 2018 Parker received the Tobacco Great Award from N.C. State University's College of Agriculture and Life Sciences. This award recognizes members of the agricultural community who have exhibited an exemplary dedication, loyalty, and passion for the support of tobacco farmers and the enhancement of the tobacco industry in North Carolina. Some of Parker's awards include the Gold Leaf Award, presented collectively by the Rocky Mount Chamber of Commerce and the Tobacco Board of Trade, the Elk of the Year Award, and the Ruritan of the Year Award.

Other farm-related activities include assisting with the booth sponsored annually by the N.C. Tobacco Growers Association at the N.C. State Fair and serving as a Supervisor of the Nash County Soil and Water District. He has also been a member of the Extension Advisory Councils of both Nash and Edgecombe Counties and a Nash County representative to the

N.C. State University Foundation Board. He also does a weekly agri-business farm report for the local Rocky Mount television station, WHIG.

Parker's civic involvement includes his membership at St. John's Episcopal Church, Battleboro, where he has been a Lay Reader since 1969; he also taught the Senior Ladies Sunday School Class at Battleboro United Methodist Church for about 30 years. He is a member of the Rocky Mount Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks where he has served as Chaplain and Esquire, has progressed through the Chairs, and conducts both the annual Memorial Service and the Flag Day Ceremony. Parker is a past-President of the Leggett Ruritan Club, now the Leggett Civic Club, and he is the Secretary-Treasurer of the Roanoke and Tar River Gun Club (Big Field).

Parker is a part-time auctioneer for various organizations. He conducts the annual auctions at both the Battleboro United Methodist Church and the Boddie-Noel Boy Scout Classic Auction at Southern Pines. He also auctions for the Wild Turkey Federation, for Ducks Unlimited, and for numerous charity groups. He enjoys composing his own story poems and giving after-dinner entertainment for civic organizations where he shares his repertoire of classic country songs and his treasury of personal and other poetry recitations.

Parker's hobbies include listening to vintage country music and studying its history, reading, and enjoying his family's pet dog, Lily.

Parker currently resides in Battleboro, N.C., and is married to the former Carolyn Staton of Scotland Neck, N.C. They are blessed with their son, James Patrick Philips.



Hardee by EVH Manufacturing Company continues Eldred Hardee's vision

BACK IN 1958, Eldred V. Hardee built his own tobacco sprayer to use on his farm in Loris, S.C. His neighbors were so impressed with what he did that they asked him to build sprayers for them and he had orders for 12 additional sprayers before he could even finish his own.

With that tobacco sprayer, Hardee launched a new business to build quality farm equipment. He named his business Hardee Manufacturing Company, and it didn't

take long for the company to grow and expand beyond sprayers.

Today, Hardee by EVH (the EVH for Eldred V. Hardee) is one of the most respected names in farm equipment,

the highest standards. A commitment to excellence and quality was the vision of Eldred V. Hardee.

Yes, Hardee still makes sprayers that are widely used across much of the United States. They also make hydraulic boom mowers, rotary mowers, disc harrows, high volume water pumps, and landscape and garden equipment, all in the signature Hardee red color. Today, Hardee employs 50 skilled workers who work out of Hardee's 100,000-square-foot facility in Loris.

The equipment Hardee makes is well known for its durability and robust design and build. A key is that all of the equipment is manufactured, not just assembled, by experts in Loris.

Hardee is still owned by some of the original Hardee family. Eldred Hardee died in 2005 at the age of 80. The legacy he established from the start still remains. Eldred Hardee believed in hiring local people and contributing to the local economy, and that continues today.

From the start, Eldred Hardee used the slogan "farmers building equipment for farmers," and that same philosophy remains. Today, the company sells its products through dealers in 25 states as well as overseas. The company made its first overseas sale in 1966 to a farmer in Athens, Greece. The Caribbean and South America are important export markets for Hardee.

The good news is members of the Hardee family continue to serve customers. Blaine Hardee, Eldred Hardee's great nephew, joined the company in January 2021, while attending Coastal Carolina. After graduation, he was offered a full-time position in marketing but wasn't long he got the opportunity to hit the road doing outside sales.

Blaine's grandfather, Waldo Hardee, Eldred Hardee's brother, went into the fuel/oil business in Columbia after serving in the Air Force during the Korean Conflict. Blaine's father, Joey Hardee, opened up his own restau-

Carolina University in Conway, S.C.

Blaine says he has discovered a passion for agriculture and considers it an honor to be part of his family's company that has been known and respected for almost 70 years. He says his job is rewarding because he represents a high-quality brand that delivers value to farmers and landowners.

Blaine says Hardee's signature product is its boom mowers. "Our boom mowers really stand out. We are one of the very few companies in the United States that make boom mowers, here in the states. Although, our rotary cutters and other lines are second to none."

Blaine stresses that farmers remain their target customer. "Farmers have one of the toughest jobs in the world, and we at Hardee want to continue building quality and reliable equipment to make their job a little easier."

North Carolina is Hardee's biggest state in terms of revenue. Blaine says the Southern Farm Show is the best way to reach out to its customers. Hardee by EVH has participated in every Southern Farm Show since the first one in Raleigh in 1978.

"The Southern Show has always been very important























Lumberjacks Return

Gaston Sealey Company treats customers like friends, family



BACK IN THE DAY, Gaston Sealey wore a cowboy hat when most of the men in Eastern North Carolina wore fedoras. That cowboy hat soon became the signature item for the much-respected farm equipment distributor.

As Fitzhugh Sealey, Gaston Sealey's son explains it, the owner of Continental Belting, based in Texas, gave Gaston Sealey one requirement for Sealey to sell his products. He brought out a box, opened it, and revealed a brand-new cowboy hat.

"Sure, Gaston, you can sell my products. But you have to wear this cowboy hat. It will set you apart and people will remember you if you wear this cowboy hat. It became his trademark, a sales feature that worked," Fitzhugh Sealey says.

From that point on, Gaston Sealey was known for that cowboy hat he would always wear.

Gaston Sealey began his career as a mailman in Charlotte, N.C., but with a desire to return home to Fairmont, N.C. The young Sealey accepted a position to sell farm equipment for Carl Meares, a North Carolina state senator and owner of a local tractor dealership. Sealey worked for Meares for several years, but soon decided to branch out on his own and launch a new business.

In 1951, he started Gaston Sealey Company, Inc., to sell farm equipment and grain handling equipment. The company started as a wholesale distributor selling sprayers,

seeders, other types of farm equipment and even some grain handling equipment.

The company began to grow and expand, with its good location not far from Interstate 95 and close to the South Carolina border. Farmers, both large and small, all the way from Florida and Georgia and up to Virginia, became loyal Gaston Sealey Company, Inc. customers.

Over the years, 74 to be exact, the company diversified into grain handling equipment, grain bins, grain storage and grain dryers. Gaston Sealey died in 1990 at the age of 69. Gaston Sealey's children, sons Wade Sealey and Fitzhugh Sealey, both completing their studies at N.C. State University, and one of his daughters, Velvet Sealey Leggette, a graduate of both Peace College and Campbell University, all joined the business operations.

Wade specialized in grain storage and grain handling equipment while Fitz concentrated on farm equipment. Velvet handles all the business accounting. Wade passed away in 2016 at the age of 64.

"We're a small family business. We started out sweeping the floors for our dad and worked our way up. The good Lord has really blessed us over the years," Fitz says.

Today, Gaston Sealey Company has 10 full-time employees. Fitz handles sales and distribution while Velvet serves as the finance manager. The company specializes in designing grain storage and handling equipment for farmers, large and small

"We've always believed in having parts on hand and providing excellent service. We keep all of the equipment out of the weather elements. We have always strived to offer immediate service," Fitz says. He emphasizes that no customer is too large, or too small. They serve farmers with just a few hundred acres all the way to those very large farmers, with thousands of acres.

"We have sales representatives that call on dealers and sales representatives that call on farmers on their farms to help them with their grain handling and storage. We can help farmers customize and design their dryers, bin and augers, according to the way they want or need it," Fitz says. "We have been around a long time. That really goes a long way towards our success. Word of mouth really helps us gain new customers."

Fitz says it all comes down to respect.

"I've learned two simple things. One, if you tell a man that you are going to call him back, call him back. When you call him back, be honest with him. If you can't provide him with a service, then be up front and tell him. If you can't protect the price, tell him. He can live with that, and he will appreciate it. If you lie to him, it's bad news," he says.

Fitz says the key to success is to treat each customer as a friend, even family. He says this is very rewarding and what their business is all about.

"In this day and time, to feel good about people and to help them succeed means a lot. That's what we try to do, and we hope that our customers feel good about us. Our customers know that any time they need something, within reason, we will do all we can to help them. You don't see a lot of companies do that these days. Most say, 'it's 5:00, the door is locked and that's it."

Gaston Sealey Company has exhibited at the Southern Farm Show every year since the very first show held at the N.C. State Fairgrounds in Raleigh in 1978. Fitz says a lot of the old timers still come by our booth, remembering his dad's famous cowboy hat, which he always wore at the show in those early days.

Fitz says the Southern Farm Show is a "wonderful show for us" because it is always well attended by farmers and is held at a time of year when the farmers are not busy working in the fields.

"Today, every other industry is online. Our customers use the internet, but they still want that personal connection. They want to see you and talk to you. That personal contact and personal connection is very important. Customers want to talk with you one-on-one and the Southern Farm Show is great for that," Fitz says.

Bringing the Horse Power

AMID A DENSE southeastern forest, Chad Miano and his Suffolk draft horses "Alabama" and "Chief" can be found moving in harmony as they harvest and remove felled trees from the forest floor.

Miano is the owner of Miano Horse Powered Logging and in his 30th year of business. He and his team of horses will harvest a diverse set of tree species and will operate in large and small timber parcels. They move on average between 100,000 and 150,00 board feet of timber each year.

Miano grew up playing sports and working on his family farm in rural southwest Virginia. He credits this upbringing with helping him prepare to enter the physically demanding logging industry. After he graduated from college, he landed a job at a farm that had draft horses and became passionate about them. He headed to the forest and started his career shortly thereafter.

"I always wanted to run my own business. At 22 years old, I applied for a business loan to start logging," he said. "I like the work. I like cutting timber, working with the horses, being in the woods and being my own boss."

Miano started out with a part-Suffolk mare named "Sally" and a Belgian gelding named "Rocky." He liked what he saw from other loggers using the Suffolk breed and purchased his first purebred pair of geldings in 2000. Today, he has seven Suffolks — four he currently uses for work and three he is training.

"These horses have been bred for physical and mental attributes that make them perfect for logging," he said. "They are very willing horses. You just have to get them to

understand what you need them to do. It's more of a working relationship than a confrontational one."

Throughout his career, Miano has always had help from his family. In the early days, help came from his younger brothers Todd and Dylan. Today, it often comes from his four children Victoria, Frank, Elliemay and Craig.

"It's always been a family affair," he said. "I always wanted to stay a small business."

He usually stays within a 40-mile radius of his home in southwest Virginia, but over the years, he has logged all over the eastern United States. Landowners usually find him through word-of-mouth.

"We are a good fit for landowners who want the lightest logging footprint possible," he said. "We use sustainable methods; selective hewing and we hand cut our trails. When we are done, the landowners will still have an intact ecosystem," he said.

He has also seen an uptick in work through media exposure, which culminated in 2012 when he was featured on the History Channel show, "Ax Men."

"I have never been without work," he said. "Now, we have seen our share of tough times, but as long as I have a tree or some sort of boundary to work, my horses have never let me down. When times get tough, I can always go get my horses and we can get a load out."

When they are not in the forest, Miano and his team can be found on the horse pulling circuit. Since 1998, Miano has participated in many Southern Farm Show horse pulls. The Southern National Draft Horse Pull is often the opening event for the Blue Ridge Horse

Puller Association's season.

"I like the competitive aspect of horse pulling," he said. "In a competition that is often dominated by Belgian horses, it gives me an opportunity to showcase the Suffolk breed and what these horses can do."

In 2024, "Alabama" and "Chief" made him the points champion in the heavy

weight pulling division of the Blue Ridge Horse Pullers Association. They finished third at the 2024 Southern Farm Show and had several other high placements throughout the pulling season.

The 2025 Southern National Draft Horse Pull is scheduled for Friday, Feb. 7, at the Hunt Horse Arena.



Fencing tips for livestock producers

WELL-CONSTRUCTED FENCES not only keep livestock in, and boundaries well marked, but if properly built and maintained, they can last for many years and have a great return on investment. Matthew Whitt, general manager of Pasture Management, offers these tips for producers interested in improving their fencing.

- Understand wire labels Producers may notice a series of numbers when they go to buy fencing wire, such as 10-47-6-330 12.5ga C3, but may not know what these numbers mean. The first number (10 in this example) is the number of horizontal wires, next is the height of the fence in inches (47), followed by the vertical wire spacing in inches (6) and the length of the fencing roll in feet (330). Next, is the wire diameter (12.5) and last is the class of the wire (C3).
- Know correct post spacing Producers should match their post spacing to the wire they choose. Class 1 wire is less expensive but requires more posts than

for durability and longevity," Whitt said.

■ **Select the right knots** — Different wire joining methods work for different situations. The fixed knot woven wire is the strongest, but there are many types of knots on the market.

"If you want the strongest, longest-lasting fence you can build, look for high tensile, class 3, fixed knot wire," Whitt said. "There are other knot types, such as smooth knot, or s-knot, which is great for horses or goats because it does not have ends that may knick or scratch hides."

■ **Protect your fence** — Keep livestock from damaging the fence by installing an electric wire on the top or the middle of the fence to prevent animals from rubbing on the fence and damaging the wires.

Based in Mt. Pleasant, N.C., Pasture Management tries to attend each Southern Farm Show to connect with their dealers and customers.

"We have the opportunity to interact with and educate the attendees on triedand-true Pasture Management products as

well as the products we are introducing into the marketplace over the next year," Whitt said. "Additionally, we gain valuable feedback and knowledge about what producers are experiencing in the industry and how we can help meet their needs."


have a great return on investment.

This year, they have a new product, Speedrite Hot Tip Outrigger, that they are excited to show to attendees.

"Speedrite Hot Tip Outrigger is the only live hot top outrigger on the market," Whitt said. "It reinforces perimeter fencing by deterring livestock and predators from damaging the existing fence. It works with wood posts, comes in two lengths and is made from 6mm galvanized spring steel. It is UV stabilized for long-lasting durability."

They will also showcase many of their existing products including Pasture Management posts, medium tensile fence and fixed knot high tensile class 3 wire.

"Neither wire is incorrect, but you need to take post pricing and wire pricing into account," Whitt said. "Generally, by selecting a high-tensile, class 3 wire that is a little more expensive, you save time and money because you do not need as many posts to retain the integrity of the wire."

■ **Choose wire strength** — Wire comes in different strengths including low carbon and medium and high tensile. To keep their livestock contained, producers need strong

"Low carbon wire is not ideal for fences that need to keep cattle contained," he said. "It may be a good option for gardens, though. High tensile wire is always recommended for perimeter fences and for big

■ Look for durability — The class of wire refers to the coating that protects the steel and prevents rust.

Flue-Cured Tobacco Production in 2025 – A Focus on Yield

THE 2024 GROWING season was filled with adverse growing conditions from seeding to selling. Despite these challenges, tobacco producers remained optimistic and persistent. As July wound to a close, the 2024 flue-cured crop was one of the best many had seen in quite some time. This observation was true across the entire production belt, from Florida to Virginia. Of course, Mother Nature had other plans as Hurricane/Tropical Storm Debby made landfall in early-August and made her way through each production region. With massive yield losses in 2024, thoughts for yield and economic opportunity are front and center as we begin to focus on 2025.

The first and most obvious focal point for yield is variety selection. We're fortunate that we have access to a diversity of genetic material that is superior to what was available even a decade ago. A recent analysis of modern varieties shows that breeders have broken through the yield plateau of the 1980s and have found methods to incorporate better disease resistance along the way. Producers should strongly consider planting modern varieties.

The second talking point is really a list of different management strategies producers should consider. Tobacco is a difficult crop to manage and is one that

requires constant attention to detail. While one or two small changes may not be detrimental to yield on their own, the cumulative effect of numerous issues is believed to play a part in commercial yield reductions. Producers are encouraged to consider the following practices:

- *** Site selection:** plant only the best areas of a field, avoid low spots or areas with a history of disease.
- * Planting date: results from planting date studies are variable, but better yields are more consistently achieved when tobacco is planted as early as possible.
- * Layby cultivation: layby cultivation should be done as early as possible to minimize root damage (which leads to reduced root health and creates entry points for pests).
- ***** Timeliness: this applies to all management activities but is especially true with fertilizer application, first and second cultivation, pesticide applications, and topping.
- * Topping and sucker control: Tobacco plants lose 1% of their full yield potential everyday they are in full flower, as such early topping will result in higher yield when compared to later topping.
- * Irrigation: Tobacco is relatively drought tolerant but should be irrigated in times of severe drought. A good rule of thumb is to apply one inch of water per week

- * Harvest timing: leaves are at their maximum weight when they become ripe and will lose mass as they transition into a state of being over-ripe. Most modern varieties have at least a two-week window between ripe and over-ripe stages before significant yield reductions are observed. Producers must balance this against leaf styles that are in demand by purchasers.
- *** Input selection:** fundamental inputs for tobacco have not changed in recent years; however, there is a growing trend to apply products that have not been tested by Extension. In most cases, these products have no agronomic value and can have negative impacts on crop vigor and growth.

The upcoming tobacco season appears to be one with great promise. Farmers are

uniquely situated to obtain good yield (and economic return) when making sound decisions and with a lot of help from Mother Nature.

Soil health takes center stage at the Southern Farm Show

HEALTHY SOIL HAS numerous benefits for producers, and the industry's understanding of how to improve the soil is evolving. Southern Farm Show vendors are available to help attendees improve the composition of their soil.

"Healthy soils allow producers to reduce inputs, which saves them money; and at the same time increase crop yields and improve profitability," said Yazmeen Rodrigues, marketing director for Enlightened Soil Corp. "Healthy soils help create a cropping system that can sustain itself."

Southern producers can face challeng-

farmers to balance the budget and operate with a positive revenue basis, it is nearly to the point were ignoring soil health or not taking advantage of improving soil health can be extremely detrimental to the farmer and the farming operation."

Nutrient deficiencies are a big concern for producers as they can dramatically impact yields. Calcium deficiency is one issue that is common throughout the Southeast. 




